Fast Facts

Did you know....

1. The holidays bring joy and laughter, but also the risk of serious injuries from falls, fires and poisons. It's important to recognize the potential dangers associated with holiday decorating, such as the use of candles, ladders and holiday lights, and take extra care.
2. According to California Builder and Engineer magazine, the indirect cost of a workplace accident can be 10 times that of the direct costs. Indirect costs include training and compensating replacement workers; repairing damaged property; accident investigation and implementation of corrective action; scheduling delays and lost productivity; administrative expenses; low employee morale and increased absenteeism; and poor customer and community relations.
3. While most categories of accidental fire are declining, one category is on the upswing: candle fires. Candles have become such popular decorative accessories that during the last decade in the U.S., fires caused by candles have tripled in number to 18,000 per year.
4. Safety tips about decorative lighting: Only decorate with lights that have a NOEL or U/L testing agency label. Check wires, plugs and sockets for defects. Do not overload outlets and extension cords. Don't run electric cords under carpet, seat cushions or anywhere they may be crushed or broken. Turn off all decorative lights during hours when the building is not occupied.
5. Safety tips about Christmas trees: Make sure natural grown trees are fresh. Cut the trunk on a 45-degree angle, about one inch above the original cut, and place it in a sturdy stand. A large tree should be anchored to prevent it from toppling over and possibly catching fire. Be sure to place trees away from fireplaces, radiators, television sets, and other sources of heat that may prematurely dry out the tree and make it more susceptible to fire. Make sure the tree has a sufficient amount of water at all times. When using an artificial tree, make sure it is made of a fire resistant material. Lights should be hung on plastic trees only, never place electric lights on a metallic tree.
6. Building owners should not believe that just because the proper fire equipment is installed and in place, that it will be in operable condition to fight fire. The reality is that maintenance is a critical component of effective fire protection.

7. Each year in the United States, nearly 300 people die from ladder-related incidents, and more than 175,000 people are injured.
8. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), in a recent year there were more than 5,000 hospital emergency room-related injuries associated with snow throwers. CPSC has received reports of 19 deaths since 1992 involving this piece of equipment.
9. Falls on ice plague all industries where ice occurs. These incidents often involve high-cost, lost-time claims. Minimizing slipping-on-ice hazards is complicated by the fact that many plants have too large an area to keep sanded or salted.
10. In a recent survey sponsored by Risk Control Strategies, 82% of senior executives responsible for human resources and security reported that the number of workplace violence incidents has increased in the last two years.
